F YOU WANT TO LEARN rose exhibition secrets on how to groom your roses for the upcoming SRS Rose Show, be sure to attend our Bring Home the Silver Workshop on Saturday, June 11, at 11:00 a.m. at the garden of Mrs. Helga Dawn-Frohling 140 Harvest Lane in Southampton. There, Freda N. Smith, ARS Consulting Rosarian, Horticultural Judge, Arrangement Judge will give a hands on demonstration and take you step-by-step through the process of choosing your roses in the garden, hydrating and grooming them so you can bring home the blue ribbons and trophies at the SRS Rose Show on Saturday, June 18.

Freda Smith has been a member of the American Rose Society since 1995 and in 2006-2007 she was certified as an ARS Horticulture and Arrangement Judge. As of 2007



she also became certified as a consulting Rosarian.

In both South Florida and Columbus, Ohio, where she was past President of the Central Ohio Rose Society, Freda Smith has won numerous trophies at various rose shows and has grown over 175 different varieties of roses.

Freda is also a member of the Manhattan Rose Society, The Long Island Rose Society, The Greater Palm Beach Rose Society, The American Rose Society, The Ceres Garden Club in Rye, New York and the Sogetsu Ikebana Society of Manhattan.

Her interests in roses and horticulture also have made her a student of the school of Ikenobo, Ohara & Sogetsu and she studied Ikenobo Ikebana at the Morikami

Museum in Delray Beach, Florida. Recently she attended a workshop at the Nippon Club in Manhattan with Master Mr. Kawana from Tokoyo, Japan.

When she lived in Florida, Freda was a Chairman of the Planning and Zoning Board, founder of the Pompano Beach Historical Society and Ft. Lauderdale Junior Symphony Society. She was executive director of the Pompano Beach Bi-Centennial celebration and volunteered and co-chaired at various charity events. Freda Smith is also a licensed Real Estate Broker in Florida.

Freda now resides in Rye, NY, most of the year and has a garden at her son's home in Farmingdale, NY, where she is growing over 100 different varieties of roses.

Top Exhibition Roses

GR THE 41st consecutive year, the American Rose presents its annual survey of the top exhibition roses, with tabulations for the prior tenand five-year periods. The tables include the complete results of the 2010 show season.

In the hybrid teas, 'Gemini' continued in the No. 1 position and the next five positions were unchanged as well. 'Let Freedom Ring' continued its rapid rise, up another four positions to No. 7. There were no other substantial changes of note.

There are two new hybrid teas, with 'Marilyn Wellan' in a debut at No. 22 and 'Marlon's Day' at No. 25. They replaced 'Suffolk' and 'Raphaela' in the chart.

In observation of the ten-year anniversary of the advent of a separate miniflora court, separate charts are now presented for miniatures and minifloras.

The top five miniatures remain unchanged, with 'Bee's Knees' continuing as the top exhibition miniature. 'Ty' is nearing the top ten, but the greatest movement is recorded by 'Joy', which entered the list at No. 13. 'Joy' scored the most miniature Queens in 2010 and was second in the number of points recorded, so it is expected to enter the top ten next year.

'Butter Cream' retained it position as the top miniflora, followed by the same three minifloras from the previous list. Behind them, however, there was considerable activity. 'Whirlaway' continues its whirlwind rise, up into No. 5. Behind it are several newer minifloras, including 'Show Stopper', which enters the ratings at No. 10, and the very new 'First Choice' and 'Shameless', at Nos. 21 and 23.

For the floribundas, the effects of the ARS ruling on the identity of the roses 'Nicole' and 'Hannah Gordon' is being reflected in the reports. Roses reported as 'Nicole' are down two positions into No. 3, while 'Hannah Gordon' is up another four into No. 5. 'Playboy' and 'Lavaglut' take over the top two positions, while 'Sexy Rexy' holds steady at No. 4. The reclassified 'Johnny Becnel' continues to rise, moving up seven slots into No. 15. Also moving up strongly is 'Julia Child', up four into No. 17. New to the list this year is the 2007 AARS winner 'Moondance', which replaced 'Blueberry Hill' in the standings.

With few exceptions, all of the roses in these tabulations are also fine garden roses, as evidenced by their high RIR garden ratings.

Get Ready, Get Set, GROW!

P NOW YOUR garden must be showing lots of activity. With all the rain and cold weather we've had at the start of April, you must have been wondering if spring will ever come. Well, spring has sprung. I hope you have done your rose pruning, but for you snow birds just arriving home, it's never too late.

Cut back last years growth on your grandifloras, florabundas, shrub roses, hybrid teas, BUT NOT ON YOUR CLIMBERS. You trim them back after the first bloom in June. Of course you can do a little cosmetic clean up, but save the heavy stuff for later.

I want to tell you about fertilizing, which you can start working on now. The benefit of fertilizing is that it gets into the plants when it needs it most and that is during the active growing and blooming season. As the weather starts to warm the soil, you should think about your feeding routine. I have for years used a 5-10-5 fertilizer. Some people say 10-10-10 is better, then there are diehards who swear by 20-20-20. My suggestion is 5-10-5. It's inexpensive, does the job and you will have beautiful roses. It is important to water well, the day before and the day after fertilizing. This protects plants from damage to the roots or foliage. It also helps move nutrients into the root zone.

Don't forget to scratch in a handful of Epsom Salts around each rose bush. Don't scrape too far down as you don't want to disturb any tender roots. I have discovered a WON-DER fertilizer... actually I have included it in my routine for years. It's called MILORGANITE® and is made from the sludge in Milwaukee sewers. Must be all that beer and Bratwurst. It doesn't burn the plant. contains iron, and is long lasting. I use it together with my 5-10-5. It not only feeds ALL your plants but also keeps the deer away. It smells awful, but it works and doesn't harm the animals. The rabbits no longer nibble on my tulips or my hyacinth leaves, and the deer stopped eating my crocuses. It lasts for a long time by feeding plants besides discouraging deer.

I also use LIQUID FENCE[®] as a protection against the deer. I spray my roses with it after a rain, or after watering. One good spraying is good for a month. Again it has an odor they don't like and after a month they are trained to stay away.

One last thing you may consider doing at this time of year. For my first spray of the year I use Pesticide Spray Oil. It is used only once while the plants are still dormant and starting to grow. It's an insect spray It controls all stages of insects, including eggs, as well as mites, scale, etc. Spray the soil around the plant as well as the canes. Once in early spring will help keep your roses free of last years pests. Make certain you have cleaned the flower beds of last years detritus. Now put down a good mulch, and sit back and wait for the first blossoms of June. Next month we'll take a look at Japanese beetles.
