Preparing for the Rose Show with Helga Dawn



ur deepest thanks to Helga Dawn for so generously hosting the pre-show workshop and for sharing her knowledge and the kind of pre-show advice that can only come from a rosarian with a lifetime of hands-on experience in the garden and at the rose show. The workshop began in Helga's garden, where she showed us how to prepare for the show well in advance. We learned how to disbud other flowers on the stem of a rose that shows potential as a show candidate as a single stem, to produce a larger flower for the show. If your goal is to show a spray, Helga advises removing the center bud in the spray – if left intact it will bloom first and ruin the spray for the show.

To be entered in the show, your rose must be correctly identified. You cannot show a rose that is misnamed, misclassed or misplaced. We learned on what basis and how many points may be awarded to a rose. Helga recommends joining the

American Rose Society—they are a valuable resource. In addition to *American Rose* magazine, ARS members receive each year the new edition of the *Handbook for Selecting Roses* in which roses are rated on a scale of 1 to 10. The higher your rose is rated, the better the chance you will be able to grow a show-worthy specimen, perhaps even an award winner!

Huguette Hersch discussed shrub roses, which she loves for their fragrance and likes to show. The stems of many are covered with tiny thorns, and Huguette removes them with her fingers (they come off easily) so she can handle the rose to prepare it for the show.

- To select a rose for the show, choose one with a long, straight stem. To prepare it, remove very tiny leaves and outer petals that are damaged. Shine the leaves by gently rubbing with your fingertips. You can moisten a paper towel with a bit of milk and use that, then rub leaves with your fingers. Past SRS President Harvey Feinstein uses peds to shine rose leaves before the show. To hold the rose upright in its display bottle (bottles are provided at the show), wrap a wedge of plastic wrap around the stem. If your rose is not fully open, gently use a pencil or your fingers to spread the petals a bit.
- When your rose is in the bottle, fill out its official tag and attach it to the bottle. Fold up the bottom to hide your name from the judges. If you're new to the show, don't worry—knowledgeable assistants are on hand at the show to help you!

2018 Spring Workshops

PRUNING AND PLANTING WORKSHOP



Thanks again to Peter Bertrand for sharing his knowledge with us. There is always something new to learn! Here are a few valuable takeaways from the many Peter shared with us:

- Prune your roses when the forsythias bloom.
 This year spring came later than usual, but forsythias are a reliable guide.
- You can't kill a rose by pruning! There is a saying that pruning is the kindest cut for a rose.
- The goal of pruning is to open the center of the plant, to help it dry out after rain or watering.
 Water is the biggest carrier of disease for roses.
- Wood that looks dark brown in spring will dry out and die in summer—prune it off.
- Looking for new roses for your garden? Peter recommends any rose rated 8 and above in the ARS
 Handbook for Selecting Roses.



THE CHILDREN'S MINI ROSE AND ART PROGRAM

Program Co-Chair Carol Kroupa explains: This program for 5 to 10 year old children demonstrates our Southampton Rose Society's purpose to promote educational projects. The original program was created by former President Adeline Christie during 2007 and has continued every year. Peter Bertrand, Chairman of our SRS Education Committee, presents a hands-on demonstration for the children including planting, feeding and watering a Mini Rose. The Children also have the opportunity color beautiful Rose and Flower sketches provided by Nancy Rollins. In addition to the Committee, the workshop includes Liz Kearns and daughters, Grace and Juliette, who help out. Each child takes home a Mini Rose and their art work. Refreshments are served. 
